Submission for unsolved murders inquiry:

In 1990 I lived at a rural 38-acre horse property at Gearys Gap off the Federal Hwy near Lake George and Bungendore

In February 1990 (I remember the month and year as my daughter was 6 months old at the time)

It was probably a Saturday night as my husband was a jockey, and he had to restrict his eating prior to racing and that evening we were having a substantial take away meal at home.

It was a stormy raining night. Our home was well off the road, up a driveway over 100 metres long. Our property was also fully fenced due to having horses and the entry to property from the road was gated. The front door was also unusually configured at the rear of the home.

I was surprised to hear knocking on our back door. I partially opened the door which had a security latch and there was a man standing there in a priest's outfit. I felt terrified, I knew something wasn't right. We had a very well behaved and well-trained German shepherd dog called Kruger. Totally out of character Kruger flung himself towards the gap in the door, at the man and Kruger broke his tooth on the door.

The man dressed as the priest said, my brother is up at the car our Pajero has broken down at your driveway. By this time husband had come up to the door. The priest said lock up your dog, my husband against my instincts took the dog and locked him in the laundry. The priest said I just want your husband to come outside and help with jumper leads. My husband was all set to open the door, and I said no. My husband then said through the gap in the door, and holding the cordless phone I'll call NRMA. The priest said, no don't call NRMA. My husband said I'm calling them. Then the priest took off.

Years later I was watching 60 minutes on TV, and I saw Richard Milat being interviewed. I immediately recognised him as the man dressed as a priest.
