I am writing this as a friend of Janine Vaughan.

Janine went missing in December 2001, and more than two decades later, she is still missing. For those of us who knew her, that's something we live with — not just as a case, but as a person who never came home.

Over the years, many of us have felt that the initial investigation did not go far enough, particularly given the seriousness of the situation. We believe opportunities may have been missed early on that could have changed the outcome.

What I want to specifically raise in this submission is the CCTV evidence from the night Janine disappeared.

I have personally listened to portions of that CCTV audio using my own available technology. Even with basic tools, there are elements within that recording that stand out and raise further questions.

This leads me to strongly believe that with today's advanced forensic and audio analysis technology, that original CCTV footage could be re-examined in a much more meaningful and detailed way than was possible in 2001.

The fact that this footage still exists within police records is significant. It is not lost evidence — it is evidence that may not yet have been fully realised.

From my perspective, this case deserves renewed, focused attention using modern investigative tools and techniques. Technology has come a long way in the past 20+ years, particularly in areas like audio enhancement, pattern recognition, and forensic analysis.

If there is even the smallest chance that revisiting this evidence could uncover new information, identify individuals, or provide clearer direction — then it should be pursued.

Janine deserves that. Her family deserves that. And so does the community that has never forgotten her.

This case is not just part of the past. It is still unresolved, and it still matters.
