Submission to the NSW Parliamentary Inquiry into Dingo Conservation, Management and Interactions

To the Committee,

I am writing to express my strong support for greater protection of dingoes in New South Wales and to urge the Committee to recommend an end to routine lethal control of dingoes in NSW National Parks.

Dingoes are Australia's apex land predator and play a vital role in maintaining healthy ecosystems. By naturally regulating populations of kangaroos, feral goats, foxes and feral cats, they help protect native plants and wildlife. Removing dingoes can disrupt these natural systems, leading to unintended environmental consequences and further biodiversity decline.

I believe the current approach to dingo management is outdated and does not adequately reflect modern scientific understanding of the ecological importance of dingoes. Management decisions should be based on the best available evidence and recognise the significant environmental benefits that healthy dingo populations provide.

I also strongly support recognising and respecting the cultural significance of dingoes to First Nations peoples. Traditional Owners have lived alongside dingoes for thousands of years, and their knowledge should play a central role in future management decisions.

Where conflicts occur between dingoes and livestock, the priority should be non-lethal management. Greater investment in measures such as exclusion fencing, guardian animals, improved husbandry and other proven coexistence strategies can help protect farmers while conserving this iconic native species. Lethal control should not be the default response.

I also encourage the Committee to ensure that dingo conservation policies reflect current genetic research. Management should focus on conserving wild dingo populations rather than relying on outdated assumptions about their status.

Australia is experiencing an unprecedented biodiversity crisis. Protecting native apex predators such as dingoes is an essential part of restoring healthy ecosystems for future generations.

I respectfully ask the Committee to recommend:

- An end to routine lethal control of dingoes in NSW National Parks.
- Greater recognition of the ecological importance of dingoes in environmental policy.
- Increased support for non-lethal livestock protection methods.
- Stronger involvement of First Nations Cultural Custodians in dingo management.
- Updated policies that reflect current scientific and genetic research.

Dingoes deserve to be protected, not persecuted. Future generations should inherit healthy landscapes where this remarkable native species can continue to fulfil its essential ecological role.
