Dear Ministers

Please vote to give full legislative protection to Dingoes in National Parks. We need to legislatively protect our native dingoes, doing so will be beneficial to the environment and to the economy. We need to do this now while we still have native dingoes unlike other countries who have had to start rewilding from scratch.

Overseas countries like the USA reintroduced their Apex predator in the Yellowstone National Park against the critics with amazing results and also in the Scottish Highlands with the reintroduction of the Eurasian Lynx and Grey Wolf against fierce debate but with amazing results. The same rewilding is bringing back much needed balance in nature in other east European countries where there reintroduced of native apex predators has brought a natural balance and natural culling to wild deer, pig and rabbit numbers to the benefit to other native fauna and flora.

I think the fear of Dingoes is a generational unwarranted and sometimes ignorant fear and misunderstanding and misrepresentation of the Australian native Dingo as a wild dog is scientifically incorrect. Science has proven the dingo dna is unique and totally different to the domesticated dog, these feral domesticated dogs are the cause of damage done to farming stock.

As I have just said the Australian Dingo has a different genetic profile to the domestic dog, these feral domesticated domestic dog continually breeds throughout the year with Dingoes it's only the alpha male and female who breed only once a year having 4 to 5 pups which the dingo pack help to look after and they only live to 10 years of age.
